## Reflections and future ambitions: President's Message

Learned societies exist to recognise and represent talent and merit. This has always been in plentiful supply in Wales, yet it was only in 2010 that the Council of the newly formed Learned Society of Wales met. We have been catching up on our sister societies in other parts of the United Kingdom since, and have made much progress, leading to the recent award of Royal Charter status. Uniquely we recognise scholarship across all disciplines, Welsh institutions, commerce, the arts and humanities, and public service in Wales. Today we have 384 Fellows.

We rejoice and take pride in supporting talent, in encouraging academics at all stages of their careers, and promoting research. We are a national society but international in outlook, working with partners within and outside Wales. We enjoy the support of all the universities in Wales, and our role is complementary. The Fellowship is a substantial capacity of expertise and learning. Post devolution we have a particular contribution to make. Of course we are politically neutral, but we are also a dispassionate and informed source of comment and advice on substantive issues, a critical friend of government, important when the National Assembly is unicameral.

There is a large challenging agenda. Harnessing better the expertise of talent in Wales is an important public service, as is promoting the best of Welsh academia. We will expand our footprint across the nation in both languages, provide opportunities and activities for our Fellows, and crucially encourage and inspire youth by demonstrating the value of excellence.

The Society's guiding role of "*Celebrating Scholarship and Serving the Nation*" is delivered by promoting the work of a wide range of disciplines, facilitating the exchange of knowledge and ideas, providing independent expert scholarly advice on a variety of public policy issues, enhancing public understanding and debate, and promoting public intellectual life in Wales. The Society recognises excellence primarily through electing distinguished Fellows and awarding medals and prizes that acknowledge scholarly accomplishment.

### Strategic objectives include:

- Promoting and disseminating Welsh research and scholarship, engaging the public's interest in and understanding of science, technology, medicine and the arts, humanities and social sciences in Wales.
- Providing a representative and independent voice for all scholarly disciplines and delivering an independent forum for informed debate on scientific, social and cultural subjects.
- Fostering partnerships and links between academia and other sectors of society, including industry and commerce, the professions, the arts, public service, schools and colleges with a view to promoting the health of intellectual life in Wales.
- Supporting research and innovation in Wales and more widely, to stimulate the development of new research areas, including interdisciplinary and inter-sectoral research, and aiding the commercialisation of research-driven innovative ideas.
- Providing advice for the development of national policy, and acting as an impartial expert and independent source of scholarly enquiry, evidence and comment.
- Engaging with comparable academies in the United Kingdom and overseas.

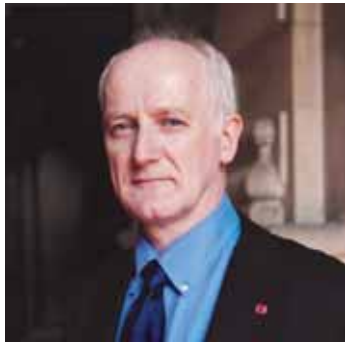

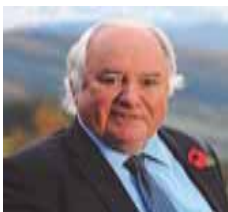

# Brief History

## ***A Small Smart Nation***

Wales has a proud tradition of achievement in many areas of education, science, engineering, medicine, the arts, humanities and the social sciences. The theory of natural selection, the early development of crystallography, the discovery of free radicals and meson decay, a key driving force behind the establishment of the world's first national health service, the invention of the microphone, the fuel cell and the teleprinter, and more recently, ground-breaking research into embryonic stem cells, all comprise part of Wales's distinguished scientific history. Wales is also home to leading research in many areas of the arts, humanities and social sciences with pioneering work in dictionary development, translation and language technologies, the UK's first Department of International Politics, one of the world's largest visual art prizes (Artes Mundi), the National Eisteddfod, and distinguished authors and poets, such as RS Thomas, Dylan Thomas and Kate Roberts.

## ***Learned Societies***

Within the United Kingdom, learned societies such as the Royal Society (established in 1660) and the British Academy (established 1902), were set up to foster the knowledge and capabilities of UK scholarship. In addition, other key national bodies that embraced the full range of academic disciplines were formed, and included the Royal Society of Edinburgh (established in 1783) and Royal Irish Academy (established in 1785).

Despite not having a civic capital, there was strong interest in Wales in establishing a society to promote the literature, arts and the sciences dates back to the early 18<sup>th</sup> century.

## ***Establishment of the LSW***

The creation of the first national academy of learning in Wales was the subject of interest and discussion for several years prior to the launch of current Society in May 2010. However, the idea was taken forward in a practical way in 2008, when a group of some twenty independent

scholars representing the major academic disciplines came together to address and make good the lack of a learned academy national academy in Wales.

This initial group formed themselves into a Shadow Council for what would become the Learned Society of Wales and set about identifying further eminent scholars who, along with the original group, became the Society's Founding Fellows. Sir John Cadogan was elected the Society's Inaugural President in February 2010. On 18 May, with financial support from the University of Wales and the endorsement of the Welsh Government, the Learned Society of Wales was legally established, being incorporated as a company limited by guarantee

*The Society's establishment marks a very important development in the intellectual and cultural life of our nation. Wales is often described as a small but clever country: the quality and breadth of our scholarship is evident in the list of Founding Fellows. But, until those Founding Fellows came together, in a wholly spontaneous and voluntary initiative, to establish The Learned Society of Wales, we in this country lacked an academy of learning of the kind that has long existed elsewhere in the United Kingdom and worldwide. Now, we have a learned society that — over time and properly-supported — can do much to emulate the great academies of London and Edinburgh, as well as those that flourish across Europe, in Northern America and beyond.*

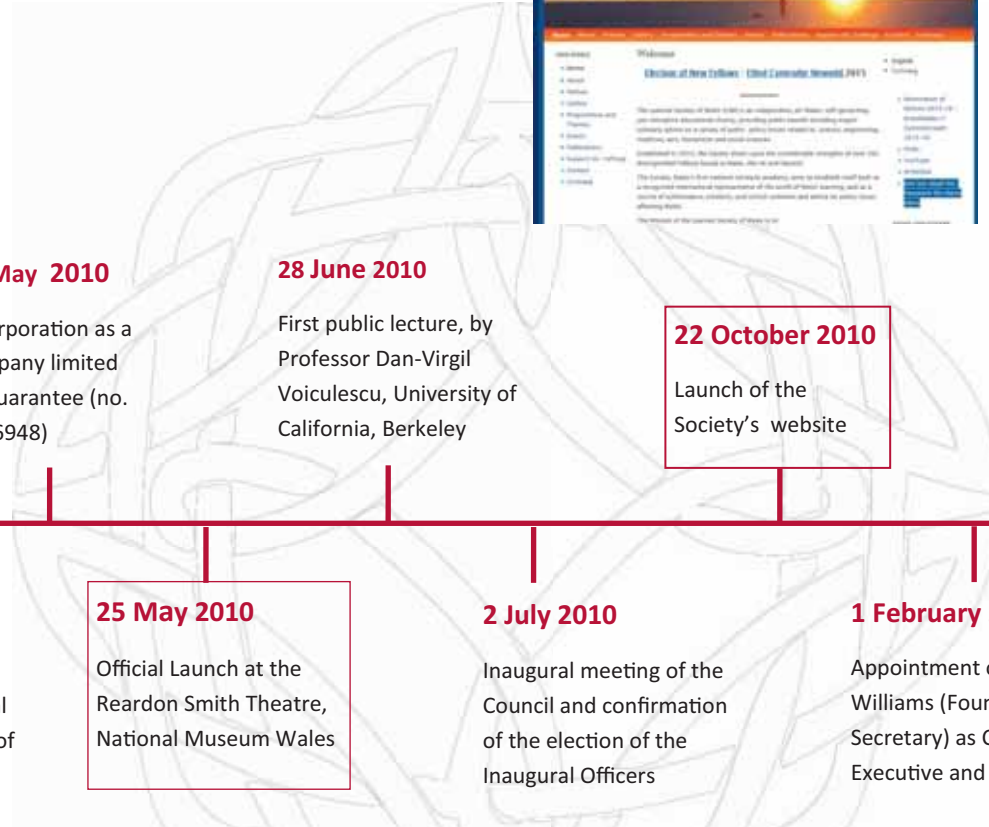

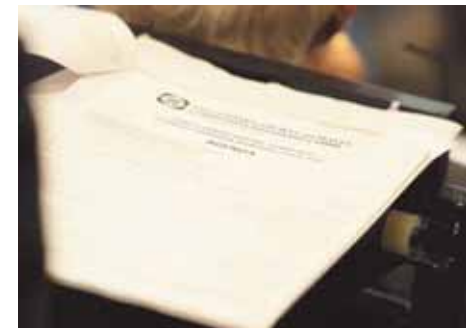

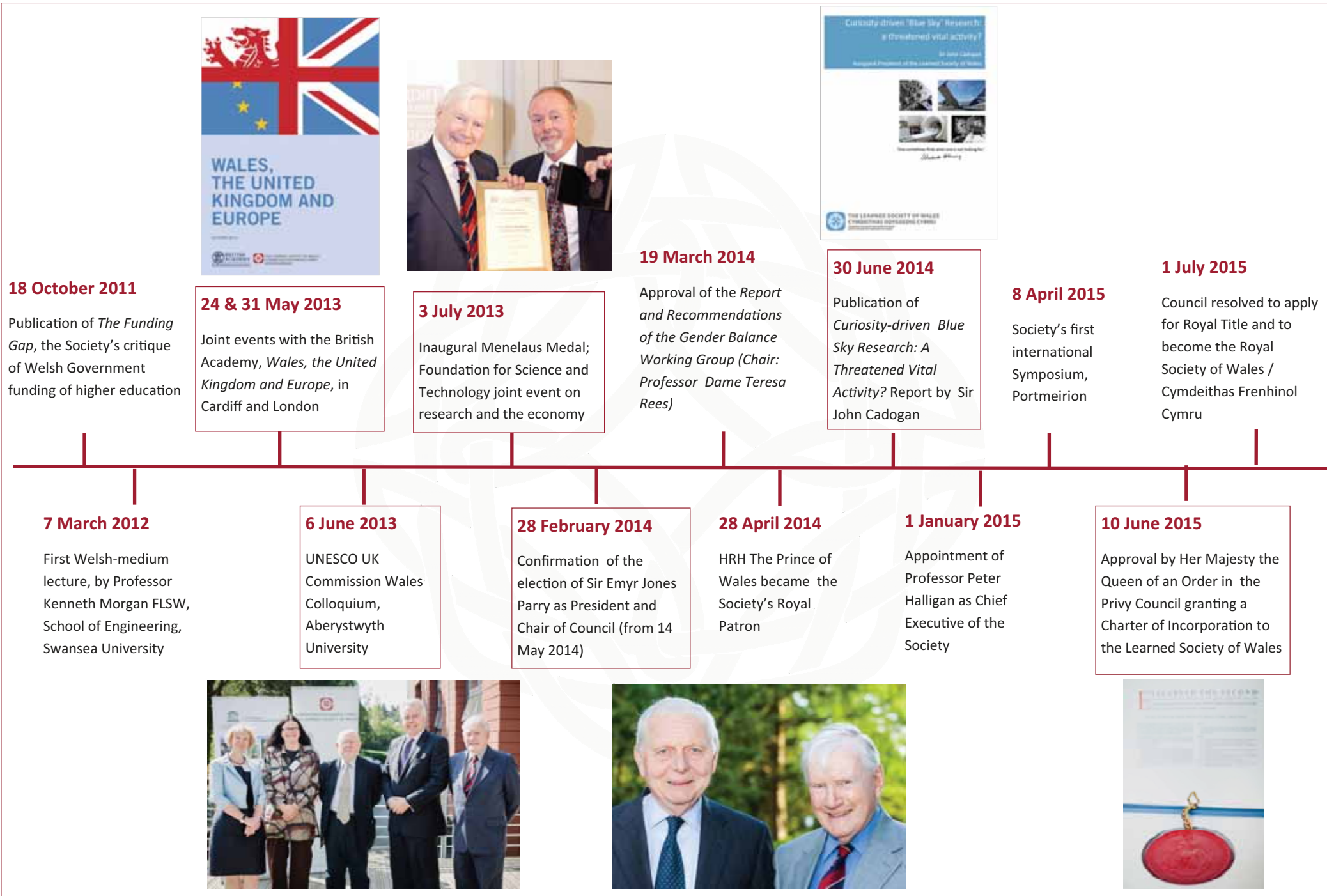

## Gender Balance

Under-representation of women is a feature of many long-established learned societies. In 2013 the Learned Society took steps to try to address this problem for its own Fellowship.

In 2013, 12% of the Fellowship were women and, in the Election Cycle that began that year, women made up just 13% of those nominated for election. In October 2013, the Council established a Working Group on Gender Balance to advise it on how the imbalance in the gender distribution of the Fellowship might be addressed.



The group, chaired by **Professor Dame Teresa Rees CBE FAcSS FRSA FLSW** made several recommendations designed to correct the under-representation of women in the pool of nominated candidates, without weakening or compromising the scrutiny process. This was approved by Council in March 2014.

In 2014/15, 40% of the candidates nominated, and 35% of those Fellows elected, were women.

## Our Fellows



Underpinning the success of the Society is its Fellowship. Fellows serve on its various committees and working groups and represent the Society nationally and internationally, helping to ensure that the Society aims are taken forward for the benefit of Wales.

Election to Fellowship of the Learned Society of Wales is through nomination by existing Fellows and is open to men and women of all ages :

- *who demonstrate a record of excellence and achievement in any of the academic disciplines or who, being members of the professions, the arts, industry, commerce or public service, have made a distinguished contribution to the world of learning; and*
- *who are resident in Wales, or who are persons of Welsh birth but are resident elsewhere, or who otherwise have a particular connection with Wales.*

Fellows are all prominent figures who represent a high level of international expertise and knowledge within their academic disciplines and professions. Election to the Fellowship is a public recognition of excellence and confers considerable prestige. The Fellowship includes some of Wales's leading scholars, including Fellows of the Academy of Medical Sciences, the Academy of Social Sciences, the British Academy, the Institute of Physics, the Royal Academy of Engineering, the Royal Historical Society, the Royal Society and the Royal Society of Chemistry.

By October 2015, the Society has nearly 400 elected Fellows. A full list of Fellows can be found on the following pages.
